## Birzeit University Department of Languages & Translation ENGC 1000 Course Syllabus/ Sem. I, 2024-2025

## 1) Course Description

English 1000 is a non-credit beginners' course that provides students with basic command of English; integrates the four skills; listening, speaking, reading and writing; helps students do the following: understand and use familiar everyday expressions and basic phrases; make simple introductions, ask and answer simple questions; interact in a simple way; use simple grammatical structures.

## 2) Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

#### Writing Skills:

- 1. Introduce students to a practical and efficient approach to learning the skills, strategies and knowledge that are necessary for succeeding in content coursework.
- 2. Provide opportunities for students to explore their opinions, discuss their ideas, and share their experiences.
- 3. Differentiate between general and specific statements.
- 4. Know how to write better introductions.
- 5. Learn how to conclude a paragraph.
- 6. Learn how to use transitions and connections.
- 7. Learn how to write coherent paragraphs.
- 8. Learn how to achieve unity.

#### Listening and Speaking Skills:

1. Listen attentively and carefully

2. Take part in conversations, small group, and whole group discussions, showing an understanding of when to speak and when to listen.

3. Listen for a variety of purposes including gathering information, to follow directions, to participate in a discussion, to form an opinion, to understand information, and to enjoy and appreciate.

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- 4. Evaluate the impact of a range of discussions.
- 5. Value listening as a means of learning and enjoyment.

6. Realize that listening is an active, constructive process that is important in educational institutes and in students' daily lives.

7. Select and use the appropriate strategies in order to organize activities before, during, and after listening.

#### **Reading Skills:**

**1.** Enhance vocabulary building ability by using different strategies of learning new vocabulary items.

2. Digest a reading passage and answer questions based on the same reading.

3. Read for a variety of purposes including to gather information, to follow directions, to give response, to form opinion, and to understand information.

4. Organize different pieces of information logically, and present them by maintaining the correct order.

5. Read textbooks, passages, essays, letters, magazines, newspapers and internet articles in English language for academic purposes.
